HOW MUCH TO WATER AND HELP SAVE YOUR TREES AND SHRUBS FROM THE DROUGHT!!! Drought stress can be relieved by removing any weeds and grass from beneath the tree (they compete for water). Place a 3-4" layer of mulch back 6" away from trunk around the tree. If you haven't been watering this spring or summer, it may not be too late to save them. Water at the base of the plant and deep soak the root ball and the immediate area outside the root ball area. The surrounding ground is going to suck the moisture away from the immediate root ball so it is important to soak the entire area. Watering this way will actually cut down on the visits you actually have to make with the hose. It is also best for your plants if you water this way. Plants generally like to be thoroughly saturated with water and allowed time to drain in between watering. The exception to this is the first week or two after initially planting. After that it is imperative plants be given time between watering to drain. This is also how you get plants to establish themselves in their permanent location. If the plant is given time to drain between watering then the roots will chase the water into the surrounding ground. If watering daily the roots have no reason to go anywhere. Furthermore, roots need oxygen and if they are continually saturated they will begin to rot. One of the most difficult things in gardening to do is to get a plant turned around when it is afflicted with root rot or other fungal problems initiated by over watering.

On average, you should water:

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1 gallon = 2-3 minutes
 2 gallon = 3 minutes
 3 gallon = 3-4 minutes
 5 gallon = 5-7 minutes

 7 gallon = 7-10 minutes
                               /
10 gallon = 10-15 minutes
15 gallon = 15-20 minutes
                             / 7 to 15 gallon trees
20 gallon = 20-25 minutes
25 gallon = 25-30 minutes
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                                 larger trees
45 gallon= 30-40 minutes
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New plantings – 2 to 3 times per week till October – November.

Established plantings – 2 to 3 times per week till October – November.
