President, Sam Liggett called the meeting to order at 6:00pm.

Minutes of last board meeting: No meeting in December. (November Board minutes were in December Gazette #1)

<u>Vice President:</u> Bob Archer reported the speakers for the upcoming months were:

<u>Corresponding Secretary:</u> Verna reported that the board meeting set for July 11th needed to be changed as that would be during the Vigo Co. Fair. The Board agreed to change it to Tuesday, July 2 at the Pie Company at 6:00pm.

<u>Treasurer:</u> Carl Trent reported on the balance after expenses as of 1-1-13.

COMMITTEES: <u>Assessment and dues:</u> Cyd Hunter stated that several people have not turned in hours for 2012. These need to be turned in as soon as possible. New badges have been received for two certified members, one bronze member, and one gold 2000 member.

<u>Giving Garden:</u> Greg Fields and others will be planting for Earth Day and the Herb Fair on Monday, January 7. A planning meeting for the Giving Garden has been set for January 25 at 10:00am in the Floriculture Building. Bob Archer reported that the brush pile by the Giving Garden needs to be burned. Jim Luzar will take care of that.

<u>Gardens:</u> The Patriotic Garden: wait for spring.

Hawthorn Park: pruning will be done in March.

<u>Old Business</u>: <u>Spring Seminar</u>: Is set for March 9 at Ivy Tech. Speakers have been confirmed. Several sponsors have also been confirmed. These can be found on the web site. Contact persons are Brenda Kirchner and Yvonne Russell. It was suggested that we see if our date can be added to the Indiana Gardening Magazine.

<u>Christmas in the Park:</u> Our display won second place this year earning us \$1,500. Over \$300 was made from the train ride and the hot chocolate sales.

<u>Valley Viewer:</u> We have the date of February 17th set up for the Valley Viewer. It will concentrate on the Spring Seminar. We could not have a second date. The Junior Leaders have a date set up for September 22nd. They will highlight the Giving Garden in theirs.

New Master Gardener Class: Class will run from Tuesday, February 5 through May 7 at the Fairgrounds Floriculture Building from noon to 3:00pm. Nine people have signed up so far. The class will be limited to twenty people.

<u>New Business:</u> <u>Proposed budget for 2013:</u> Should be named Proposed Expenses for 2013. Verna handed out the list of proposed expenses. This will be voted on at the Planning and scheduling meeting on January 15.

Larry Agee made a motion to give a donation of \$200 to IVY Tech, as a partner in the Giving Garden. Carl Trent seconded the motion. It was passed by the board.

Some plants to look for in 2013:

2013 Perennial Plant of the Year: Variegated Solomon's Seal (Polygonatum Odoratum Variegatum.

2013 Herb of the year: Elderberry

2013 All-American Selections (AAS) winners ----

- 1. Canna "South Pacific Scarlet" Huge 4-inch blooms of orange-red with gold flames on a compact plant. Thrives in hot, sunny, moist to damp soil.

 Tolerant of a touch of frost. 4-5' tall.
- 2. Echinacea "Cheyenne Spirit" A mix of bright prairie colors on vigorous, quick-flowering plants that bloom just 23 to 24 weeks after sowing and never need deadheading. 18 to 30" tall.
- 3. Geranium "Pinto Premium White to Rose" Grown from seed. 5" blooms are long lasting and slightly earlier than similar varieties. Performs extremely well under heat.
- 4. Cherry Tomato "Jasper" Small deep red cherry resists late blight. Crack resistant. Indeterminate.
- 5. Melon "Melemon" Taste similar to honeydew but with a delicious tanginess. Green rind turns to chartreuse at maturity, white flesh. Days to harvest sowing seed is 85 to 95 days.
- 6. Watermelon "Harvest Moon" Hybrid, triploid seedless similar to "Moon and Stars" but with shorter vines. Has a sweet, pinkish-red flesh.
